Goals and Objectives

- #1 Develop and implement outreach programs to educate members of the public about transportation, land use and air quality issues and their interrelationships, and the transportation planning process and how they can be involved in it.
- #2 Solicit the participation of local officials, community groups, and individual citizens in the transportation planning process.
- #3 Reach out to under-represented persons and groups, including lowincome and minority populations and those of Limited English Proficiency to ensure that decisions are made with their input taken into consideration.
- #4 Inform the general public of the federally funded transportation projects and planning activities for each fiscal year.
- #5 Provide notice to the public that the Strafford Regional Planning Commission/Strafford MPO operates its programs and conducts its planning activities in accordance with the nondiscrimination requirement under Title VI, and members of the public can request additional information about the obligations of the Planning Commission.

- #6 Continually identify and implement ways to improve the public input process.
- #7 Ensure no person is denied access to, or the opportunity to participate in, Metropolitan Planning Organization programs.
- #8 Avoid disproportionately high or adverse impacts on communities.
- #9 Improve the public involvement process.
- #10 Involve the public by providing opportunities for input early and often in the transportation planning and decision making processes.
- #11 Document public involvement process, comments, and responses for all transportation planning documents.

The Commission meetings for FY 2018 were held at Bedrock Gardens in Lee, the Rollinsford Library, the Newmarket Town Hall, and the Governor's Inn in Rochester. Two of these locations were on a COAST or Wildcat bus route.
